Flowering Perennials & Ferns

	<p>Aquilegia formosa (Crimson Columbine) Whether in a sunny garden or in the shady redwoods, the Crimson Columbine's spur-bearing flowers and delicate leaflets are a sight to see. Prefers moist soil with good drainage. Plant among <i>Asarum caudatum</i> or <i>Oxalis oregana</i> for a low growing backdrop.</p> <p>5" band \$4.95 (Wholesale \$3.25) One Gallon \$9.95 (Wholesale \$4.95)</p>		<p>Rubus parviflorus (Thimbleberry) Part shade & moderate water. Thimbleberry has large leaves, white flowers, edible berries, and creates a lush spreading thicket. Like many Rubus sp. it is great for erosion control yet luckily it lacks those pesky thorns. Will attract many birds and pollinators to the garden.</p> <p>5" band \$6.95 (Wholesale \$4.95) One Gallon \$11.95 (Wholesale \$6.95)</p>
	<p>Polystichum munitum (Western Sword Fern) Full shade with low to moderate water. The Western Sword Fern is great for woodland gardens and shady areas that need a lush pop of green. Occurring from southern California to Alaska, this is one of our most common pacific coast ferns. Easy to maintain and old fronds can be cut back to the base.</p> <p>4" pot \$6.95 (Wholesale \$4.95) One Gallon \$11.95 (Wholesale \$6.95)</p>		<p>Iris douglasiana (Douglas Iris) Sun to partial shade & occasional to moderate water. Found in sunny coastal prairies to the redwood forest. Has strikingly large flowers that range from blue-ish purple to buttery yellow and attracts a wide range of pollinators. Will form spreading clumps of dark green leaf blades. Prefers heavy soil with organic matter.</p> <p>One Gallon \$11.95 (Wholesale \$6.95)</p>
	<p>Epilobium canum (California Fuchsia) Sun to part shade & low water. This scarlet flowered perennial is great for rock gardens and any dry areas that need an extra pop of color. This is a plant that hummingbirds will often be seen fighting over. Spreads by rhizomes and can be used as a ground cover. After fall dormancy, cut to the ground to make room for spring growth.</p> <p>One Gallon \$9.95 (Wholesale \$4.95)</p>		<p>Asarum caudatum (Wild Ginger) Shade & moderate water. Found in wet woodlands often by streams. It will spread by rhizomes and create a nice groundcover with unusual red-brown flowers hiding under the leaves. The leaves are highly aromatic with a spicy, gingery scent.</p> <p>4" pot \$6.95 (Wholesale \$4.95) One Gallon \$11.95 (Wholesale \$6.95)</p>
	<p>Sisyrinchium bellum (Blue-eyed Grass) Full sun & low water. Despite its common name, blue-eyed grass is actually related to the iris. It is a common flower of grasslands and is much loved by native bees. Prefers well drained loamy/sandy soil. Leaves die back end of fall and can be cut back to the ground. Readily reseeds itself.</p> <p>5" band \$4.95 (Wholesale \$3.25) One Gallon \$9.95 (Wholesale \$4.95)</p>		<p>Lonicera hispida (Pink Honeysuckle) Part shade & occasional water. This durable vine can grow as a ground cover, on a trellis, over shrubs, and on slopes. Its pink flowers attract hummingbirds and its berries attract berry-eating birds. Perfect for redwood gardens and shady areas under trees.</p> <p>One Gallon \$9.95 (Wholesale \$4.95)</p>
