


Now, see our picks for the best plants to attract hummingbirds to your garden!




Epilobium canum (California fuschia) 1 gallon @ \$11.95



- Pretty silvery foliage and bright red flowers make *Epilobium* an eye-catching feature in any garden. The hummingbirds can't get enough of it!
- Fast-growing and quick to establish itself, *Epilobium* canum will require little water and will spread around via rhizomes. Plant in full sun or partial shade for best results.





Monardella villosa (coyote mint) 1 gallon @ \$11.95

- Monardella villosa is perhaps best known for its minty fragrance, though its clusters of purple flowers are a treat for the passing hummingbird.
- If planted in a sunny or partially shady plot with well-draining soil, Monardella becomes a low maintenance and rewarding plant. The leaves can even be used to make tea.

Salvia mellifera (black sage) DP60 @ \$15.95




Salvia leucophylla (purple sage) 1 gallon @ \$15.95



Salvia spathacea (hummingbird sage) 1 gallon @ \$24.95











- Beautifully bushy and dotted with lovely orange flowers, *Diplacus aurantiacus* is a staple for any native garden.
- Beloved by bees and hummingbirds alike, these plants are happiest in welldraining soil and full sun on the coast or partial shade inland.







- We all love Ribes sanguineum for its delightful dangling clusters of pink flowers and dark little berries it produces in late summer. Though the berries are not very tasty for us humans, many birds love them- making Ribes sanguineum a near year-round bird magnet.
- Ribes sanguineum is quick growing and does best with little water and in either shade or sun.
